In West Wales the business case for a new SARC 'Hub' in Aberystwyth is due to be submitted to Welsh Government. This strategically appointed site will support victims and their families in the north Dyfed-Powys region to receive timely support and care.

This will be a significant milestone in the WSAS Programme. The SARC Hub will not only provide help and care in the acute phase, but a holistic, multi-agency supported space providing 24/7 access that will have the capacity to support the local communities and surrounding areas.

One of the greatest challenges of working on the WSAS Programme implementation, has been bringing so many key stakeholders together- which has also been one of the greatest strengths of the programme too!

We all have a vision for services that put the needs of the victim at the centre, building a model of care that will be sustainable in the years to come.

WSAS PROGRAMME UPDATE

Since our last newsletter we've seen major steps towards the new SARC 'Hub and Spoke' model across south Wales regions. Here are a few highlights:

Redirection of acute cases and 'ISO accreditation'

All SARCs in Wales and England are currently working hard to meet the 'ISO accreditation' deadline in October 2023. The accreditation is for all centres where forensic medical examinations are carried out.

Across south and mid Wales, acute cases that require a forensic medical examination will gradually be redirected from SARC 'Spokes' to the Cardiff, Swansea and Aberystwyth SARC 'Hubs'. This process is already underway, with Merthyr Tydfil having transferred its acute forensic cases to Cardiff in February 2023.

Acute cases requiring a forensic medical examination are currently still being seen at Risca, Carmarthen and Newtown, and communications will be sent out before any changes are made. In north Wales all cases continue to be seen at the Amethyst SARC.

Training to support paediatric provision

We were thrilled to run the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPCH) 'Child sexual assault and the forensic examination' course in Wales on 20 and 21 April.

It was a fantastic opportunity to build on existing skills within Wales and to support the provision of paediatric services within sexual assault referral centres (SARCs), with the course attended by staff from all seven health boards. "(The) Faculty were great.

A Commissioning Framework for SARCs in Wales

A Delivery Assurance Group has been established to oversee the development, delivery and implementation of an All-Wales Sexual Assault Referral Centre Commissioning Framework.

We'll be inviting professionals and survivors to be involved in this work, helping us to develop 'what good looks like' for sexual assault referral centres.

The WSAS Programme continues to make connections with a range of different services, programmes, and organisations across Wales.

Our second online engagement session was held 23 of March 2023 with sexual assault service providers and professionals. The Programme Team presented and discussed initial plans for the development of a SARC Commissioning Framework and a planned review of counselling services.

INTRODUCING OUR COLLABORATIVE PARTNERS

We would like to introduce you to some of the individuals and teams working with and supporting victims of sexual violence and abuse. Find out more about their roles and the amazing work they do!

Amethyst Sexual Assault Referral Centre Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board, North Wales

The Amethyst SARC has 3 CYPSVAs (Children and Young People's Sexual Violence Advisers) and 2 YPSVAS (Young People's Sexual Violence Adviser).



Our CYPSVAs are Hannah Mart, Sandra Roque and Heather Robertshaw. Hannah and Sandra have been in their role for over 5 years and Heather has recently joined the team.

They are able to support children/young people from the ages 0-15 yrs.

Our YPSVAs are Sharon Williams and Julie-Anne McCabe who have been in their role for 12-18 months.

YPSVAs support young people aged 16-25yrs and are able to assist young people transitioning from children's support services to adult support services when they turn 18.

Counselling for individuals who access support from the Amethyst SARC is provided through the Rape and Sexual Abuse Support Centre North Wales and Stepping Stones - find out a bit more about them below.



Rape and Sexual Abuse Support Centre (RASASC) North Wales



The Rape and Sexual Abuse Support Centre (RASASC) was established in 1983. We provide information, specialist support and therapy to anyone aged 3 and over who has experienced any kind of sexual abuse or violence.

We will support you whether this happened recently or in the past. We can also provide specialist support and therapy to partners and family members of those who have been affected by sexual abuse and violence.

Our services include:

- **Specialist Counselling and Therapeutic Intervention** tailored to meet individual needs, available face to face or remotely, one to one and group programmes
- Independent Sexual Violence Advisor (ISVA) Impartial support and information, including reporting to the police and Criminal Justice Process
- Pre-Therapy Workshop One off support programme for those in the waiting list
- Taste of Recovery online lifetime resource

Stepping Stones, North Wales

"Stepping Stones North Wales is a charity that has been supporting adult survivors of child sexual abuse for 39 years.We provide a range of services including counselling, art therapy, psychoeducational courses and resources, ISVA support and support groups across all six counties of North Wales free of charge.



All our counsellors are British Association for Counsellors and Psychotherapists (BACP) registered and are specialists in working with trauma, they work with clients at their pace and we provide a holistic service to ensure survivors can work safely and without becoming retraumatised and can go on to live their lives more fully.

'Sound Campaign'

On the 14th of July the Welsh Government launched the new Sound campaign, which encourages young men in Wales to learn about gender-based violence and 'sound out' their relationships, behaviours, and thoughts with each other.

Sound targets men aged 18-34 with engaging and informative content around healthy relationships across social media, podcasts, TV and streaming channels to counteract a narrative shared by some social media influencers promoting 'ultra-masculine' views.

Developed with men from a variety of backgrounds across Wales, the campaign has also been informed by perpetrators and survivors of abuse.

The campaign focuses on early intervention, which is one of the priorities in the current Violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence strategy.
